A Summary of the Care Act



The Care Act updates over 60 years of law around adult social care in England. The changes are wide-ranging and cover all adults with care and support needs (whether they get support from the Council or not) and carers. Some of the changes strengthen the ways that councils already work and some of them are new responsibilities.

Information & Advice

Councils have a new responsibility to make sure people have access to timely information and advice. This includes preventative services and service wider than adult social care that help people to stay well. Councils must also help people to access independent financial advice.

The Care Act gives local authorities a new responsibility to help prevent, reduce and delay people in the community (including carers) having care and support needs. Councils should work with partners including local community services and support to do this in the best way.

If a person appears to have care and support needs, councils must offer an assessment that is proportionate for that person (supported selfassessment might be best for some people, for example). The assessment should focus on outcomes. People who fund their own care are entitled to an assessment.

National Eligibility Criteria

The introduction of a national eligibility criteria for Adult Social Care means that people with similar needs will have the same eligibility for support, regardless of where they live. This is likely to be similar to Reading's current thresholds but will use different criteria.

Care Planning

Care and support planning should also focus on outcomes to improve a person's wellbeing and prevent or reduce needs. It should be developed with the person involved and, if they consent, should cover the whole family. There should be yearly reviews available.

Carers

The Care Act puts carers are on an equal footing to those they care for. Carers have the same entitlement to support to continue in their caring role whilst maintaining their wellbeing. There is a new duty to involve carers in developing a person's support plan.

Safeguarding

The law is strengthened around safeguarding, introducing new requirements to work with partners to safeguard people against harm, abuse or neglect as far as possible through a multiagency approach and ensuring it is 'everyone's business'.

Independent Advocacy

If someone needs support to be involved in assessment, review or care planning and a family member can't provide this, councils must arrange an independent advocate who is trained to enable them to be part of this process.

Supporting local services

Councils must work with organisations that provide care and support services to make sure people have a choice of high quality services in their local area. If a care business fails, the Council must make sure people using the service are supported.

Transitions

When assessing a child, young carer or adult caring for a child, councils must plan for adulthood and ensure services are in place to support this.

Moving between areas

Councils have a new duty to provide continuity of care when a person moves to a new local authority.

Paying For Care

Councils have new powers to decide what services are charged for, if people can afford to pay. The Deferred Payments Scheme (for people who don't wish to sell their home in their lifetime to pay for care) is expanded to be more widely available. From April 2016, the amount that people pay for their care will be capped, so that councils pay for any further care costs once the cap is reached.

What is the Care Act?

The law around care and support for adults changed in 2014. The Care Act brings around 30 pieces of legislation into a single piece of law for Adult Social Care in England. This covers people with disabilities, older people, and people with mental health needs.

The Care Act also sets out new duties for local authorities to support carers, giving them the same right to assessment and support with any eligible needs as the people that they care for. Because of similar new duties in the Children and Families Act (another national change to the law), these apply to adult carers of adults and of disabled children, as well as young carers.

What is changing?

The Care Act is wide-ranging, covering areas including assessment, eligibility, care and support planning, safeguarding, shaping local services, carers, preventative services and information and advice. Some of the main parts of the Care Act are in the summary above.

Reading Borough Council already works in a lot of the ways covered by the Care Act - a Safeguarding Adults Board already meets regularly, for example. People using adult social care services now won't see any automatic changes to their support, but they might notice changes in the way we work at a review or if needs change (whichever comes first).

Some parts of the Care Act give councils specific duties to ensure that needs are met. For example, there is a new duty to support children, young carers or adults caring for a disabled child so that their transition to adulthood is planned and the movement to new services is managed as effectively as possible.

What happens next?

Reading Borough Council proposed some changes to services to meet the duties in the Care Act from April 2015. For carers, we proposed supporting adult carers of disabled children in the same way that we support adult carers of adults. This would include access to assessment and support for any eligible needs identified, such as a Direct Payment or a support plan.

We consulted on our plans between November 2014 and February 2015, and we'll use the feedback to make our final decisions about changing services. You can find out more about the changes at www.reading.gov.uk/careact.



FREE CONFERENCE FOR PARENT CARERS LOOKS AT SEND REFORMS

A free conference to look at changes to the way children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) are supported at school and in the community is being hosted by Berkshire Carers Service.

Aimed at parent carers the conference will look at how the SEND reforms brought in under the Children and Families Act 2014 will affect local families, including what impact these changes have made so far.

Held at Reading University's Whiteknights Campus on **Tuesday 14 July between 9.30am - 2pm** the conference will feature experts from Adviza and the local Special Educational Needs Information, Advice and Support services (SENDIASs).


It will look at the education, health and care (EHC) plans, which are replacing SEN statements and learning difficulty assessments, and advise parents how to participate in the assessment and planning process. It will also highlight sources of support where an EHC plan is not provided.

Dalvinder Jammu, contracts manager with Berkshire Carers Service, said key to the new system is that pupils and families have more of a say about the support offered to ensure children and young people get the extra help they might need.

He said: "The changes are quite radical and we hope that this conference will give parent carers a thorough briefing on how the new systems should work and the knowledge and confidence to express their views on decisions that affect their lives."

As children, most of us would take for granted the chance to get out and about, exploring, climbing trees, visiting the park and hanging out with friends, but for many children and adults with a special need, it just isn't possible. If you have a physical disability, the difficulties are more obvious, but, if you have a learning disability, sensory problems or autism, you may find it hard to relate to other people and to join in their games. Since 1982 the Thames Valley Adventure Playground has provided a chance for children & adults with all types of special need to enjoy the fun, freedom and friendship afforded by the opportunity to play and share experiences in a safe and stimulating environment, with users travelling from Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire, London and beyond. Wheelchair-accessible roundabouts and swings, elevated walkways allowing someone with profound and multiple difficulties to enjoy the excitement of 'climbing' trees, multi-sensory rooms to stimulate and relax, with specially-trained staff to provide help and support - these are just a few of the things on offer.

Based on a 2.5 acre site adjacent to the A4 in Taplow, near Maidenhead, the Playground is open to children and adults with all types of special need, however, mild or profound, their siblings and parents/carers. People visit with families and as individuals, or with groups from schools, playschemes, day centres and residential units
